

D'HANIC LIONS CLUB

The D'Hanis Lions club was organized in 1949 for the purpose of supporting the community. The D'Hanis volunteer fire department was organized from the efforts of the Lions Club. The organization of Medina County Water Control and Improvement District No. 2 was because of the efforts made by the Lions Club. The water district drilled a well to the Edwards formation and insures permanent water for the community.

In 1960 a planned city park , dedicated to the Future Farmers of America and the Future Homemakers of America. The Lions Club maintains the park.

In 1961 the D'Hanis group was selected as first in the State as Conservation Group. This group was known as the Upper Seco Group (D'Hanis). The group was Howard Rothe, Lawrence Rothe, Bonnard Rothe, Bill Rothe, Calvin Pendele and Herman Ney. All of these members are members of the D'Hanis Lions Club.

One of the big projects that the Lions Club undertook was the flood control project on the Seco Creek. The Club raised \$7,000.00 to help relieve the town of D'Hanis from floods by cutting a ditch that helped relieve flood water. The Lions club supported the Seco Creek Watershed PL-566 application for flood prevention. The meetings that were held on the Watershed were supported and financed by the Lions Club.

The application for a sewer system in D'Hanis was initiated by the Lions Club. This sewer system is not complete but when complete it will be from the efforts made by the Lions Club.





On the night of August 28, 1957, the town of D' Hanis took on a new appearance, as ten new street lights were turned on for the first time. Prior to that time, there were no street lights in the town, which is on U. S. Highway 90 about 9 miles west of Hondo.

The lights were installed by the Cooperative at the request of the D' Hanis Lions Club, which had been working on the project for over a year. Under an agreement reached between the Club and the Cooperative, the Cooperative furnished and installed the lights at no cost to the Club. The Club will pay a monthly bill on each light.

The lights are of the 175 watt Mercury Vapor type installed in a new type "luminair". Seven of the lights were installed along Highway 90 and the other three in the main business district just north of the highway.

ITALIAN SPAGHETTI, CALIFORNIA STYLE

2 tablesp. bacon fat
 ½ cup sliced onions
 1 lb. chuck, ground
 1 minced clove garlic
 1 minced green pepper
 1 No. 2½ can tomatoes
 2 8 oz. cans tomato sauce
 1 6 oz. can whole mushrooms undrained
 1½ tablesp. salt
 ¼ tablesp. pepper
 1 tablesp. dried sage
 ¼ tablesp. dried thyme
 1 tablesp. dried rosemary
 1 bay leaf
 1 cup water
 2 tablesp. salad oil
 Meat Balls
 1 lb. spaghetti

In bacon fat in large kettle saute onions until tender. Add beef; cook, stirring often, until meat loses red color. Add garlic and rest of ingredients except oil. Meat Balls, spaghetti. Simmer uncovered, stirring occasionally 1½ hr., or until as thick as you like.

Meanwhile, in hot oil skillet brown Meat Balls quickly on all sides. About 20 min. before sauce is done, add Meat Balls. Also cook spaghetti as label directs; drain. Pour sauce over spaghetti on platter or individual plates. Makes 6 generous servings.

MEAT BALLS

1 lb. chuck, ground
 ½ cup packaged dried bread crumbs
 1 minced clove garlic
 2 tablesp. snipped parsley
 ¼ cup grated Parmesan cheese
 1 egg
 ½ tablesp. salt
 ¼ tablesp. pepper
 Combine all ingredients; mix well. Shape into golf-ball size balls. Use as directed in Italian Spaghetti above.





Seco Creek Hearing Set May 17

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

D'Hanis will consider bonding for sewer system

Medina County Water District users in D'Hanis will be asked next week to take the first step towards providing a sewer system for the community.

Before a bond issue can be voted upon, 90 per cent of the district's approximately 300 members must sign a petition asking for the election.

Financing plans for the \$300,000 project call for a \$200,000 bond issue to be financed by a \$3 monthly charge to customers, and a \$100,000 grant from the Farmers Home Administration.

The water district's five-member board has been planning the project.

In addition to the \$3 monthly charge which will

pay principal and interest on the bonds, homeowners will pay an estimated \$1.25 per running foot to install sewer line from their property line to the main.

These costs are for D'Hanis property owners who hook onto the proposed sewer line during construction. Those who wait until later will be charged an additional \$35 tap fee.

Those spearheading the project note that the system will allow the community to eliminate cesspools, septic tanks and outhouses polluting our works. Then we (will) have no choice and it will cost much more then.



New Post Office Ready For Use August - November

CONTRACTOR Joe Kilgore's plan for the Post Office building at Hondo, Texas was further advanced recently with the announcement by Postmaster (Quinn) Lathin, A. The new masonry building will have an interior space of approximately 5000 square feet, with better than 550 square feet for a loading platform and approximately 1245 square feet of outside area to be used for parking.

City's 30-Cent Key Rate Right

An announcement last week that the city's key rate on insurance had been penalized five cents because of old water mains caused Homer Wilson of the local water department to make a trip to Austin to put the matter straight.

New mains had been installed last year to insure earning the 30 cent rate which had been approved. Through some oversight, or error, this might not have been properly recorded by the State Insurance Board. Wilson was assured by the State Fire Insurance Commission that Hondo did qualify for the 30 cent rate and local insurance agents have also confirmed the rate.

GROSS STAMP SALES UP 23%

Postmaster Harry Filleman reports a 23 per cent increase in gross stamp sales in the Hondo post office for 1960.

The 1962 total was \$2,416.40, compared to the 1960 total of \$3,274.88. "The increase," said Filleman, "is due in a large measure to the increase in postal rates which went into effect last year."



Under the sponsorship of the town's service-dedicated Lions Club, a flood control project is now under way. So eager are the sponsors and the community's citizens to get the job done that completion is now scheduled for about February first.

OLD FLOODS

Records dated 1894 tell of the loss of lives as well as property at that time. Other recorded flood dates with major losses occurred in 1914, twice in 1932, and again in 1935 and 1948. The last flood made necessary help from the Red Cross and the Salvation Army to the amount of about \$5,000 in food and supplies for the flood victims.

Following the 1935 flood, previous studies made by the Bureau of Reclamation were presented but no preventive measures were taken. That flood, say those who lived through it, practically ruined the town of D'Hanis. Investigations were also made by the U. S. Corps of Water Engineers.

LIONS ACT

Based on these findings and recommendations, the members of the D'Hanis Lions Club pledged themselves to the support of a program that would eliminate existing hazards and provide for the community's safety. Raymond Nester is president of the Club this year.

Progress was slow but the determined Lions held fast to their goal for flood prevention in D'Hanis. Largely through their efforts, the idea for complete civic participation spread.

After having learned that no Federal or State aid could be received, the Lions and their fellow citizens undertook the financing among themselves.

GARRISON CONTINUES AS NAVASOTA MGR.

Jack Garrison retained his position as City Manager of Navasota after the Navasota City Council meeting on January 8 accepted the resignation of the former mayor, Gene Sanders.

According to a report in the Navasota Examiner of last week, Garrison told the Commission that he recognized a personality conflict between himself and the mayor but he said that he would try to work out the differences if the Commission so desired.

Engineers issued the required permits and their endorsement of the plans. Landowners granted the necessary easements. The cost of the completed project will be approximately \$7,000 and almost, if not every dollar of it will be home-contributed.

PLANS AND PROGRESS

An accompanying sketch shows the proposed solution to the D'Hanis flood control problem. Involved are two creeks, the Seco and the Parker. These creeks have plagued the area for many years in time of heavy rains, particularly the lowlands in the west end of town where there is a concentration of smaller homes. The town's big brick plant has also suffered heavy flood damages with each flood.

Completed now is a levee, built on the east bank of the Seco on the property of Mrs. Walter Hitzfeld, to stop the overflow of water from the regular creek bed. Now under construction is a channel, on the Woodrow Glasscock land, to reroute any future flood waters directly south and away from town. The completed channel will measure 700 feet long, 100 feet wide at the base, and 200 feet at the top. Some 35,000 cubic yards of dirt are being moved under the direction of Sabinal contractor Al Rehm who was low bidder for the job.

A brush clearing project has been completed in the Parker Creek bed in old D'Hanis. This was done to enable flood waters to flow freely down the creek bed instead of backing up into the town as before. Landowners along the stream have also cleared brush at their own expense to cooperate with the big project.

FUNDS

While the D'Hanis Lions are the original sponsors of the flood control program, the community generally has assumed a share of responsibility for its success. The D'Hanis Liedac organization is conducting a drive among the Latin-American residents many of whose homes have been damaged often by the old floods.

Said D'Hanis Lion John Poerner, a public surveyor who maintains an office in Hondo and serves as city engineer here, "The response has been most encouraging. Every resident in D'Hanis will be helped by this project including our number one industry, the D'Hanis Brick Company, all our business houses, schools, churches, and every permanent building or utility in our community susceptible to being damaged by flood waters."
